

Two Quick Tips

Repair Disk Permissions

What is "Safe Mode"?

Safe Mode is a way to start up your Mac that performs certain checks and prevents certain software from automatically loading or opening.

Starting up in Safe Mode does several things:

- It forces a check of the startup volume, just like the First Aid feature of Disk Utility. You may see a progress bar on the screen during this check, and the computer takes longer than usual to complete its startup.
- · It loads only required kernel extensions.
- · It disables all fonts installed by the user.
- It moves font caches to the Trash that are stored in /Library/Caches/com.apple.ATS/(uid)/ where (uid) is a
 user ID number such as 501 (Mac OS X v10.4 or later).
- It disables all startup items and login items in Mac OS X v10.4 or later.
- In Mac OS X v10.3.9 or earlier, Safe Mode opens only Apple-installed startup items (such items may be
 installed either in /Library/StartupItems or in /System/Library/StartupItems). These items are different from
 user-selected account login items.

Taken together, these changes can help resolve or isolate certain issues that exist on the startup volume.

Starting up in Safe Mode

To start up into Safe Mode (to Safe Boot), follow these steps.

- 1. Be sure your Mac is shut down.
- Press the power button.
- Immediately after you hear the startup tone, hold the Shift key.
 The Shift key should be held as soon as possible after the startup tone, but not before the tone.
- Release the Shift key when you see the gray Apple logo and the progress indicator (looks like a spinning gear).

After the logo appears, you should see a progress bar during startup. This indicates that your computer is performing a directory check as part of Safe Mode.

To leave Safe Mode, restart your computer without holding any keys during startup.

Why Did Apple Call It Mavericks?

While iOS 7 got most of the attention at Apple's World Wide Developer Conference this week, some TLC should be given to its desktop cousin, the Mac operating system, which got some significant upgrades as well.

Most notably is the new name of the latest version of the OS itself. In the past, Apple has relied on 'big cat' names for its iterations of software. Strong, iconic names like "Lion," "Tiger," and "Leopard." You knew the well was starting to run dry though when the more recent versions were a bit recycled: "Snow Leopard" and "Mountain Lion" anyone?

For the next versions going forward, Apple acknowledged a potential brand extinction of fabulous felines and decided to take a different direction which was announced at the keynote on Monday.

"We want a set of names that will carry us for at least the next ten years," said Craig Federighi, Senior Vice President of Software Engineering, "places that inspire us, here in California."

The first landmark to be deemed a Mac OS is "Mavericks," a popular surfing location in northern California. The name has gotten some jeering and even criticism from critics and the public with many John McCain, Top Gun and Maverick movie jokes that followed. Time will tell how the name will stick as the OS is promised to be released later this year with a great list of new features.


Auto Update in Mavericks

App Store in System Prefs.




Click through to "App Store" in System Preferences and you can set app updates to download automatically. That will happen in the background, and you'll receive a notification once it's done -- that is unless you're currently using an app, or if a restart is required. In that case, you'll get a notification with a drop-down list of options for delaying installation. FaceTime functionality has come to Notifications, too. You'll get a large pop-up image of the person calling along with a button to accept or decline the call. Miss it and you'll get a notification about it as well.
